Diocesan Action Plan for Meeting the Victorian Chid Safe Standards

The Diocesan Action Plan for Meeting the 11 Victorian Child Safe Standards has been approved by Archbishop in Council at its April meeting. Over the next weeks, we will be communicating about this plan which includes both diocese and parish actions to ensure we meet the new Child Safe Standards. This will include an info session/webinar and updates in emails and the TMA. The Action Plan can be found <u>here</u> on the Safe Ministry Toolbox. Updates to Safe Ministry and Child Safety & Wellbeing Policies and Procedures

Following the introduction of the new Child Safe Standards, the diocese in consultation with children, youth, families, staff and clergy across our diocese, has updated its Safe Ministry and Child Safety & Wellbeing Policies and Procedures. These documents have been approved by Archbishop in Council in April and will be rolled out across the diocese.

Did you know? Child Safe Standard #10 requires each organisation to check and improve the ways they keen children safe from

check and improve the ways they keep children safe from abuse and harm.

How does your parish/congregation do this? Check the Diocesan Action Plan

Volunteer and Lay Employee Registers

As all Clergy should be aware, parishes and AACs are required to maintain their <u>Volunteer and Lay</u> <u>Employee Register</u>. This Register is an ongoing, living document and tool which is to be kept up to date by each parish as a record of the screen and safe ministry training undertaken by each volunteer/employee. The Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse recommended that organisations keep records for up to 45-year post-engagment with child-related work.

Each parish will have their own administrative processes however the Vicar holds overall responsibility for ensuring that safe ministry requirements are met, including the upkeep of this register. Parishes are

For parishes who use a digital data base (eg. Elvanto) to record this information, please ensure a report with fields matching the Register can be emailed to the Registrar when requested. The Registry Services team can request this Register be forwarded to the diocese at any time and <u>CCYP</u> may also request these records as part of their compliance activity in ensuring that the Child Safe standards are met (see more information <u>here</u>).

Safe Ministry Training

After Easter the Safe Ministry Training Level 1 was updated. All those who had already completed Safe Ministry Essentials (Level 1) Training DO NOT need to do anything at this stage. These changes will be covered when completing their 3 yearly Safe Ministry Training refresher.

There are 3 ways to complete training which are explained in the <u>Safe</u> <u>Ministry Training Implementation 2023 flyer</u>. For parishes and congregations who have used the parish facilitated small group option, we hope you have found this a helpful way to training people in your parish.

Parishes can set up a group analyst to administrate the online training and access records to add to the Volunteer and Lay Employee Register. This can be set up by emailing the etraining team, <u>etraining@safercommunities.net.au</u>, and copy (cc) the safe ministry team, <u>safeministry@melbourneanglican.org.au</u>.

Safe Ministry Toolbox Webpage

toolbox of all diocesan Safe Ministry resources. These resources are updated regularly, and additional resources are added as they are developed. Please remember to familiarise yourself, your staff and volunteers with this Toolbox.
